


# MAINE PEOPLE'S RESOURCE CENTER PUBLIC OPINION SURVEY

# Methodology

- A survey of 908 likely Maine voters was conducted by phone and online from September 14<sup>th</sup> through 19<sup>th</sup>, 2018.
- Survey results were mathematically weighted by gender, age, mode of contact and geographic area to ensure an accurate representation of the population being surveyed.
- □ The sample margin of error of this survey is 3.25%, 95 times out of 100. Sub-samples may have a larger margin of error.
- Frequencies and percentages may not always add up to the total number of responses or to 100%, due to weighting and rounding.


